He teaches several classes, including exercise physiology and environmental physiology, and he conducts research on cardiovascular health and bone loss (osteoporosis). He has been funded by NASA since 1995 to study the effects of microgravity on the control of blood pressure, since many astronauts returning from space have difficulty maintaining adequate blood pressure even after staying in space for as little as two weeks. Michael has flown groups of laboratory mice and rats on sev-



eral Space Shuttle missions, including last April's STS-131 mission on Discovery. Michael has received research grants from the National Institutes of Health and the American Heart Association to study the effects of aging on the cardiovascular and skeletal systems, and how exercise can help maintain the health of these bodi-

ly systems during old age. He and his wife Judy serve as directors for their church's outreach ministry to the Saint Francis House homeless shelter in Gainesville. They have three children, Lauren (11), Grant (9) and Hannah (6).
