MISSION AND ETHOS STATEMENT

New Hall, a Catholic boarding and day school, provides **the best start in life**, enabling students to meet confidently the challenges of the wider world.

Here **academic excellence** is achieved in surroundings where relationships are based on **care, trust and respect**.

We **welcome** students from many traditions, building a Christian **community** that has at its heart **prayer and service** to others.

ADMISSIONS PROCESS

The main entry points to the school are: Pre-Reception (the academic year in which a child has his/her 4th birthday), Year 7 (age 11+), Year 9 (age 13+) and Year 12 (age 16+). Entry to other year groups may be permitted but is subject to availability.

The principles relied on in the selection of students for admission are designed to ensure the school will remain a Catholic school. New Hall accepts students of any or no faith. Applications for admission will be considered from parents and guardians who are in sympathy with the aims and ethos of the school and whose child will benefit from the academic curriculum of the school. Preparatory School

Pre-Reception (age 3+)

Entry to Pre-Reception is by parent meeting and a trial session, held at the child's nursery/ pre-school. If the child does not attend a nursery/ pre-school, the trial session will take place at New Hall. Preference will be given to those seeking a full-time, rather than part-time place and there is a minimum requirement of 6 sessions per week. A session is either a morning or an afternoon.

Entry into other year groups

Parents are welcome to register their children to enter Reception and Years 1-6 in the Preparatory School, however, day places only become available in these year groups should a current pupil leave the Preparatory School. In the circumstance that a space arises, a child will be selected from the waiting list, taking into account the school's Admissions Policy. Additional full or weekly boarding places are available from Year 3 onwards.

Should a place not become available for a child's requested term of entry, the registration will roll over to the next academic year until a place becomes available. Should a child reach Year 6 before a place has become available in the Preparatory School, parents will be contacted regarding Senior School entry. There is no need to re-register for Senior School entry.

Senior School

Year 7 (age 11+)

It is highly recommended that all candidates attend the Year 7 Taster Day in October, there is also an information session for parents. Entrance into Year 7 is based upon an interview, entrance examinations in English (multiple choice and a written paper), Mathematics and Verbal Reasoning, which are held in November, as well as a current Headteacher's report.

Applications from pupils who attend traditional preparatory schools which make provision allowing them to continue their education up to 13+, and which are not part of a structure which connects them to a particular senior school, will only be accepted (subject to the other relevant criteria set out in this policy) for Year 9 entry. Assessments may be sat in Year 8, or earlier in Year 6 if preferred, and any offer made will be for a place at the start of Year 9.

Year 9 (age 13+)

Entrance into Year 9 is based upon an interview, entrance examinations in English, Mathematics and Verbal Reasoning, which are held in January and current Headteacher's report. Candidates who are being prepared for Common Entrance examinations by their current school will normally sit these in May/June prior to entry in September. Candidates who are successful in the New Hall Year 9 Assessments will be given a conditional offer of a place subject to Common Entrance examinations.

Sixth Form (age 16+)

Students are encouraged to attend the Sixth Form Admissions Evening in October. Prospective students will need to achieve a minimum of two A grades and four B grades overall at GCSE. An offer of a place is based upon personal statement, school report, mock and predicted grades, school reference and interview with the Head of Sixth Form.

International Students

All overseas students are required to sit entrance examinations, including in English, at their current school, with an agent, the local British Council office or at New Hall. Prospective Sixth Form students are required to sit papers in the subjects they wish to study. A level of proficiency in English equivalent to at least IELTS 6.5 is required for entry to Sixth Form.

BURSARIES

New Hall School offers a limited number of means-tested bursaries, of up to 100% of fees. Details are available in the Bursaries & Scholarships Policy, which can be found at newhallschool.co.uk/policies. Applications for bursaries must be received by 8 January of the year of entry. SCHOLARSHIPS

New Hall School offers scholarships and awards at Year 7, Year 9 and Sixth Form entry. Year 7 scholarships are assessed separately for boys and girls and each scholarship is offered in both the Boys' Division and Girls' Division. For Year 9 scholarships, boys and girls may be assessed together or separately depending on the ability of the candidates. Assessment is based on performance in the New Hall entrance assessments as appropriate to the point of entry. The current Headteacher's report/reference and interview also play an important part of the assessment process. Following the scholarship assessments, students will be ranked accordingly and scholarships will be offered to the best performing students overall. Preference may be given to full/weekly boarders and Catholics, where candidates of a similar ability are being considered for scholarships.

The school celebrates the honour of all scholarship achievements and students who win scholarships gain an important benefit in terms of the public recognition, media coverage, school references, university admissions and job applications. There is a Most Able & Talented (MAT) Programme and scholars who are placed on the MAT Register are afforded additional target setting, monitoring and reporting.

Most scholarships will have a fee remission attached to them, which will normally be in the range 10%-one third remission of fees, with occasional top scholarships awarded at 50% to the highest performers in the academic assessments. All scholarships are net of prompt payment discount. The total value of the scholarships awarded will depend on the available funds. In the event that parents do not require the fee remission attached to a scholarship in order to afford the school fees, they are invited to donate part or all of the fee remission to a designated bursaries fund. Subject to the availability of funds, an additional means-tested remission up to 100% of fees may be awarded to a recipient of a scholarship, if the fees would otherwise be unaffordable.

Year 7 Scholarships:

Candidates follow the normal entrance procedure (assessments and interview). Candidates applying for a Music or Sport Scholarship will also undergo further assessment relevant to the scholarship. For entry in September, assessments will take place for boys and girls in November of the previous year.

The following scholarships categories may be awarded at Year 7:

Year 7 Academic Scholarship. This scholarship is awarded to the student who excels academically. The highest achieving academic scholar will win the Year 7 Hawley Academic Scholarship.

Year 7 Open Scholarship (all rounder). The highest achieving all rounder scholar will win the Year 7 Dennett All Rounder Scholarship. This scholarship is awarded to a student who is likely to contribute exceptionally well to the overall life of the school. The recipient is likely to be in the top quartile academically, with major co-curricular strengths. Students will be selected from the scholarship assessments and the current Headteacher's reference will be given careful consideration. Students applying for an all rounder scholarship must also apply for at least one of the following scholarships/award: music, sport or special talent (drama).

Year 7 Diocesan Scholarship. This scholarship is awarded to a practising Catholic student who is currently attending a voluntary-aided Catholic primary school, and who has attended this school for at least the final 2 years. The scholarship may be awarded for any of the 4 main scholarship categories at Year 7, i.e. academic, all rounder, music or sport. Candidates will need to provide a copy of their baptismal and first Holy Communion certificates. The priest reference form must also be completed.

Year 7 Catholic Independent Schools Scholarship. This scholarship is awarded to a practising Catholic student who is currently attending a Catholic independent school and who has attended this school for at least the final 2 years. The scholarship may be awarded for any of the 4 main scholarship categories at Year 7 i.e. academic, all rounder, music or sport. Candidates will need to provide a copy of their baptismal and first Holy Communion certificates. The priest reference form must also be completed.

Year 7 Music Scholarship. The highest achieving music scholar will win the Year 7 St Cecilia Scholarship. This scholarship includes tuition fees for one instrument (with the possibility of funding for 2 instruments, depending on ability and suitability of the second instrument). The school looks for evidence of future potential as well as current achievements. Candidates will be assessed for the scholarship by the Director of Music at the time of the entrance examinations. The St Cecilia scholar will be expected to take a leading role in school ensemble activities, and to perform at concerts and other public events.

Year 7 Sport Scholarship. The highest achieving sports scholar will win the Year 7 Anderson Scholarship. Proven sporting ability/interests will be the basis for selection and potential will also be assessed. Priority will be given to candidates who excel in at least 2 of the school's major sports (rugby, hockey, netball, cricket, tennis, swimming and athletics). In the event that a student excels in only one particular sporting field, a scholarship may still be awarded. Candidates will be assessed for the scholarship by the Director/s of Sport at the time of the entrance examinations. Evidence of the student's achievements, including a testimonial from their coach etc, will need to be provided before assessment takes place. The Year 7 Anderson Sport scholar will be expected to represent the school at sporting events as required by the Director/s of Sport.

Special Talent Award. This award will be presented to a student who excels in one area (linked to drama, music or sport) to a high level i.e. competing at county, national or international level. This award will provide the student with an annual financial contribution of £500 towards lessons or equipment in the area of special talent for the duration of their time in the Boys' or Girls' Division (a maximum of 5 years). This award will be reviewed at the end of each academic year. Students will be asked to provide ongoing evidence of their special talent. The student in receipt of a Special Talent Award will be expected to represent the school in their area of expertise.

Tennis Scholarship. This scholarship may be awarded to a student who has exceptional ability in tennis and is selected by the Head of Tennis for the New Hall Tennis Academy. Proven ability at a regional/national level is required. The Tennis Scholar will be expected to represent the school at sporting events as required by the Director/s of Sport/Head of Tennis.

Year 9 Scholarships:

These scholarships are assessed in January of the year of entry and are open to candidates choosing entry either by the New Hall entrance examinations or by Common Entrance.

The following scholarships categories may be awarded at Year 9:

Year 9 Academic Scholarship. This scholarship is awarded to the student who excels academically.

Year 9 Open Scholarship (all rounder). This scholarship is awarded to a student who is likely to contribute exceptionally well to the overall life of the school. The recipient is likely to be in the top quartile academically, with major co-curricular strengths. Students will be selected from the scholarship assessments and the current Headteacher's reference will be given careful consideration. Students applying for an all rounder scholarship must also sit the academic scholarship and at least one of the following scholarships/award: music, sport or special talent (drama).

Year 9 Open Scholarship (Catholic Award). This academic/all rounder scholarship is awarded to a practising Catholic student. The scholarship may be awarded for any of the 4 main scholarship categories at Year 9 i.e. academic, all rounder, music or sport. Candidates will need to provide a copy of their baptismal and first Holy Communion certificates. The priest reference form must also be completed.

Year 9 Music Scholarship. This scholarship includes tuition fees for one instrument (with the possibility of funding for 2 instruments, depending on ability and suitability of the second instrument). The school looks for evidence of future potential as well as current achievements. Candidates will be assessed for the Scholarship by the Director of Music at the time of the entrance examinations. The music scholar will be expected to take a leading role in school ensemble activities, and to perform at concerts and other public events.

Year 9 Sport Scholarship. Proven sporting ability/interests will be the basis for selection and potential will also be assessed. Priority will be given to candidates who excel in at least 2 of the school's major

sports (rugby, hockey, netball, cricket, tennis, swimming and athletics). Candidates will be assessed for the scholarship by the Director/s of Sport at the time of the entrance examinations. In the event that a student excels in only one particular sporting field, a scholarship may still be awarded. Evidence of the student's achievements, including a testimonial from their coach as appropriate, will need to be provided before assessment takes place. The Year 9 Sport scholar will be expected to represent the school at sporting events as required by the Director/s of Sport.

Special Talent Award. This award will be presented to a student who excels in one area (linked to drama, music or sport) to a high level i.e. competing at county, national or international level. This award will provide the student with a 3-year annual financial contribution of £500 towards lessons or equipment in the area of special talent. This award will be reviewed at the end of each academic year. Students will be asked to provide ongoing evidence of their special talent. The student in receipt of a Special Talent Award will be expected to represent the school in their area of expertise.

Tennis Scholarship. This scholarship may be awarded to a student who has exceptional ability in tennis and is selected by the Head of Tennis for the New Hall Tennis Academy. Proven ability at a regional/national level is required. The Tennis Scholar will be expected to represent the school at sporting events as required by the Director/s of Sport/Head of Tennis.

Sixth Form Scholarships:

The following scholarships categories may be awarded at Sixth Form. All scholarships are at the discretion of the Principal and are dependent on the candidates meeting all the criteria for Sixth Form awards, including a sufficiently high standard academically, behaviourally and in terms of application to work and references:

Sixth Form Academic Scholarship (internal candidates). Academic Scholarships may be awarded by the Principal following the results of the mock GCSE examinations in the Lent Term of Year 11. Within this category, two STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics) Scholarships may be awarded, subject to a minimum of 8A*s being achieved at the publication of GCSE results in August. To be eligible for a STEM Scholarship, a student must also be taking at least two subjects from the following list, in both Year 12 and Year 13: Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Mathematics, 3D-Design, Economics, Computer Science.

Sixth Form GCSE Achievement Scholarship (internal candidates). This is awarded by the Principal following publication of GCSE results in August. The award is made to the 4 top Year 12 internal entrants with the highest GCSE results, subject to a minimum of 8A*s. Only internal candidates are eligible for consideration. A successful candidate in receipt of a current scholarship may not be eligible for further fee remission. This scholarship is worth a maximum remission of two-thirds of day/full/weekly boarding fees subject to availability of boarding rooms.

Sixth Form GCSE Achievement Scholarship (external candidates). This is awarded by the Principal following publication of GCSE results in August. The award is made to the 4 top Year 12 external entrants with the highest GCSE results, subject to a minimum of 8A*s. Only external candidates are eligible for consideration. This scholarship is worth a maximum remission of two-thirds of day/full/weekly boarding fees subject to availability of boarding rooms.

Sixth Form Academic Scholarship (external candidates). The Principal has the discretion to award scholarships based on academic merit to entrants to the school at Sixth Form. Within this category:

1) Two STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics) Scholarships may be awarded, subject to a minimum of 8A*s being achieved at the publication of GCSE results in August. To be eligible for a STEM Scholarship, a student must also be taking at least two subjects from the following list, in both Year 12 and Year 13: Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Mathematics, 3D-Design, Economics, Computer Science.

2) Two Classics Scholarships may be awarded, subject to a minimum of 8A*s being achieved at the publication of GCSE results in August. To be eligible for a Classics Scholarship, a student must also be taking at least two subjects from the following list, in both Year 12 and Year 13: Latin, Classical Greek, Classical Civilisation.

These scholarships are awarded in the Lent Term preceding entry and are based on a completed application form (available from the Admissions Department), an interview, GCSE mock results and/or supporting school report and/or entrance examinations.

Sixth Form Open Scholarship (all rounder) (internal or external candidates). This award is to a student who is likely to contribute exceptionally to the overall life of the Sixth Form. The recipient is likely to be good academically, with major co-curricular strengths. These scholarships are awarded in the Lent Term preceding entry and are based on a completed application form

(available from the Admissions Department), an interview, GCSE mock results and/or supporting school report and/or entrance examinations.

Sixth Form Academic Boarding Scholarship (internal or external candidates). The Principal has the discretion to award scholarships, e.g. based on outstanding GCSE results, to students who are joining the Sixth Form as full or weekly boarders. These are only awarded if there is sufficient space in the boarding houses.

Special Talent Award (internal or external candidates). This award will be presented to a student who excels in one area (linked to drama, music or sport) to a high level i.e. competing at county, national or international level. This award will provide the student with a 2-year annual financial contribution of £500 towards lessons or equipment in the area of special talent. This award will be reviewed at the end of each academic year. Students will be asked to provide ongoing evidence of their special talent. The student in receipt of a Special Talent Award will be expected to represent the school in their area of expertise.

Sixth Form Awards (internal candidates). There are a number of Awards each worth £500 per annum. The Principal has the discretion to offer an external candidate any Sixth Form Award that has not been won by an internal candidate.

Outstanding Performer Awards:

Outstanding Performer Award (Anderson Scholarship). At the Principal's discretion, an Anderson Sport Scholarship may be offered to a student who has demonstrated exceptional achievement and who represents their country at U16 level or above in a sport for which the school has a team. Outstanding performers may be considered at any time and an interview will be arranged. The Anderson sport scholar will be expected to represent the school at sporting events as required by the Director/s of Sport.

Outstanding Performer Award (St Cecilia Scholarship): At the Principal's discretion, a St Cecilia Music Scholarship may be offered to a student who has demonstrated exceptional prior achievement (conservatoire level performance) and has the potential to perform at national and international level. In addition to fee remission, this scholarship includes tuition fees for one instrument (with the possibility of funding for 2 instruments, depending on ability and suitability of the second instrument). Candidates will be offered the opportunity to be assessed for the scholarship by the Director of Music; applications from outstanding performers may be considered at any time and an audition arranged. The St Cecilia scholar will be expected to take a leading role in school ensemble activities, and to perform at concerts and other public events.

Pre-Reception operates from Monday to Friday during term time, 8.00am - 6.00pm, for a total of 34 weeks in the academic year 2016/17. Children may attend for either a full day or morning/afternoon sessions, with a minimum of six sessions per week. A full day is two sessions. A termly commitment is required.

Payment of Fees & Prompt Payment Discount

Providing payment is received in the school bank account, or in the school Finance Department, on or before the due date, a prompt payment discount of £100 may be deducted from the standard termly fee.

Fees

Fees for the term and extra subjects are charged in advance. Fees are due for payment on or before the first day of term, except, for new pupils joining the school, the first term's fees are due by 1 August (one month before the start of term). If payment is made by post, this must be received in the Finance Department by the due date. For unpaid accounts, an interest charge, at a rate of 3% per annum over the base rate for the time being in force with the school's bankers, will be added to the account.

Direct Debit

In association with School Fee Plan, we are pleased to be able to offer parents the option of spreading the cost of school fees and any extras by monthly Direct Debit. More details are available at www.newhallschool.co.uk/fees.

Registration

A non-refundable registration fee of £80, is payable on registration. A cheque, made payable to New Hall School Trust, for the amount should be sent with the Registration Form to the Registrar. Alternatively, payment may be made by bank transfer or credit/debit card. An additional non-refundable fee of £21 is payable by overseas applicants for whom a visa is required.

Acceptance & Additional Deposit

To secure a place offered to a student, an acceptance deposit of £500 is required. An additional deposit of £3,500 is required for overseas residents. These deposits are returnable after the student's last term, after deducting charges for extras which have been incurred by the student during the final term, unless the student is removed without appropriate notice. A full term's notice of withdrawal or cancellation of acceptance is required, failing which a term's fees will be charged in lieu of notice and the acceptance and additional deposits will be offset against these fees. If the offer, once accepted, is then cancelled with a full term's notice, the acceptance and additional deposits will be retained by the school. If a student cannot come to New Hall because of illness, or inability to reach the required academic standards, or any reason judged by the Governors of the school to justify it, the acceptance and additional deposits will be refunded in full.

Additional Charges

Details of the fees for co-curricular activities, including music and dance are available separately. Details of additional charges for any 1:1 lessons within the core curriculum are available on request. Details of additional charges for additional lessons leading to qualifications beyond those studied for within the core curriculum are also available on request.

Examinations

The examination boards charge an entry fee and other service costs related for all public examinations. These charges will be added to fee accounts when students are entered for these examinations.

English as an Additional Language

For international students, there is an additional charge of £645, plus examination fees, per annum for students who are preparing for International English Language Testing System qualifications (IELTS). Additional charges may also be incurred for private tuition or one to one support.

Fees in Advance, School Fees Refund Scheme and Insurances

Details of a scheme for the discounted payment of one or more years' fees in advance can be obtained from the Finance Manager. There are also various optional insurance schemes and a school fees refund scheme available, details of which are available from the Finance Department. Overseas students wishing to access private medical care are advised to take out medical insurance through the scheme offered by the school.
